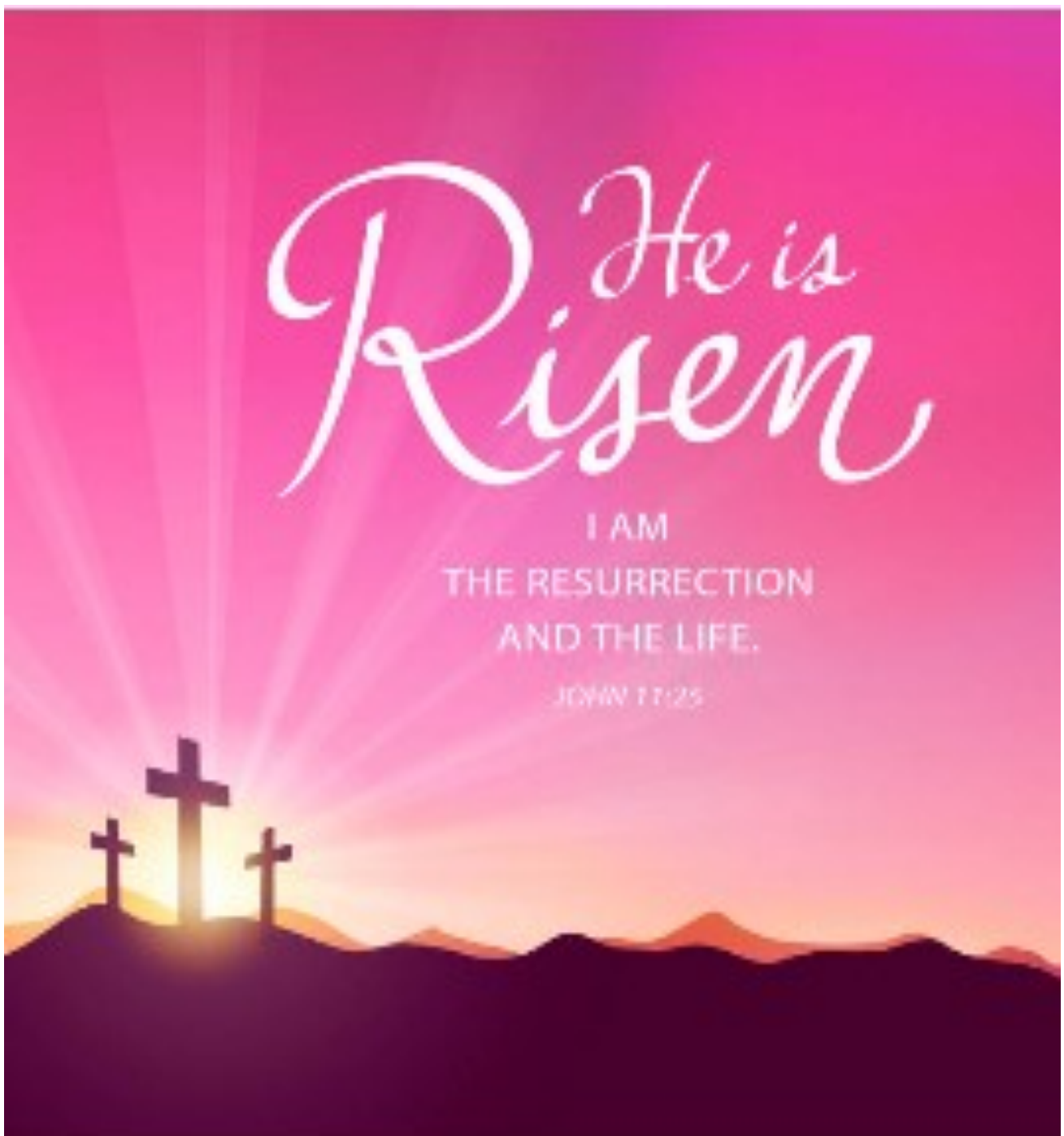

Forward From The Reverend Jane Plackett-Ferguson

Winds of Change: Holding Both the Beauty and the Burden

There are seasons in our life when it seems that the winds of change blow with a force that unsettles as much as it renews. I feel that we are living in such a moment: News reaches us daily of war in the Gulf, of rising oil prices and deepening uncertainty that we see and feel as we shop at Tesco, fill up our cars, turn on the news and scroll through our social media. We hear of climate change devastating crops in the poorest regions, while elsewhere record snowfall blankets causing glee for small children and wild disruption for others. At the same time, spring arrives quietly but insistently with its signs of continuity and hope: trees burst into bloom, lambs appear in fields, and we watch a new Archbishop of Canterbury installed.

It is tempting to ask whether the world is good or bad. Yet perhaps they it is both and neither. As Ecclesiastes reminds us, "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven." A time for breaking down and a time for building up; a time for weeping and a time for laughing. The world does not move in a single direction, and neither do our lives.

The challenge for us, as human beings, is not to resolve these tensions but to hold them. We carry the weight of global suffering alongside the immediacy of our own lives - our responsibilities, our relationships, our quiet fears. It would be easy to become overwhelmed, to let the darker currents define our inner landscape.

And yet, we are also given moments of grace. This week my five year old walked into the kitchen proudly holding up a page with her first full sentence written across the page. Your moments might be different: a smile from a stranger; an act of care from a friend; a perfectly flavoured and textured risotto; a breathtaking view.

In that moment, there is a choice. We can remain fixed on the heaviness of the world, or we can step into the joy being offered right in front of us.

Not as denial, but as an act of resistance! We can refuse to let despair have the final word.

The Bible tells us “I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Now choose life.” Even in uncertain times, we are not without choice. We cannot control the great forces shaping the world, but we can decide how we respond, what we notice, what we nurture.

To live well in such a time is to practice a kind of double vision: to remain awake to suffering without being consumed by it, and to remain open to beauty without feeling guilty for noticing it. The winds of change will continue to blow, sometimes they will be harsh, sometimes gentle. Within them we are invited to choose life, that amidst the mess and sadness, we might see God’s beauty and goodness in the world.

You and your food

We thank God for our food and those who produce it. We depend on food, but do we often consider the way the food we eat impacts the lives of humans, animals and the earth itself? If Christians worship the good creator of a good creation and look forward to the whole creation being released from its bondage (Romans 8: 21), we should consider how what we eat affects God's creation.

Impact on people: Those who work hard to produce food often get a bad deal and many places, including churches, choose to serve Fairtrade tea, coffee, sugar, and other goods in response. We do here where possible, but when gifted items from Food Share, we are also helping reduce waste. UK farmers often receive a poor deal for their produce too, with farmers protesting that supermarkets pressure them to accept prices for their goods which doesn't make their work viable. Therefore, both globally and nationally, farmers are struggling to profit from their trade.

Impact on animals: Farming is becoming more intensive. Most chickens raised for meat live for only 35 days in vast warehouses without access to daylight. Most pigs spend their lives indoors and increasing numbers of dairy cattle are not given access to grass. Old Testament law required farmers to show consideration for their cattle (e.g., Exodus 20.8-11, 22.30; Deuteronomy 25.4) and the principles behind these laws still apply today. Yet, most farm animals are now not able to express behaviours that are natural to them. Choosing animal products from higher welfare systems is an important recognition of their status as fellow creatures made by God.

Impact on the planet: The fertiliser run-off from intensive arable farming changes the nutrient balance in rivers, causing significant ecological damage, which we have seen happen in Herefordshire. Greenhouse gas emissions from transporting food and from the growing numbers of livestock raised for meat make a substantial contribution to climate change. Choosing locally produced, organic food, and reducing meat and dairy consumption lowers the environmental impact of our food choices.

HOW? Producing it –

- Find out how and where food is produced locally to you
- Avoid intensively farmed animal products, by looking out for the assurance symbols



- Avoid using products (and there are many) with Palm Oil in, as its production is a major driver of deforestation and a significant contributor to climate change
- Try foraging for food in the wild. It has many health benefits, but please follow guidelines on how to forage sustainably, responsibly, safely and within the law.

HOW? Eating it

-Eat The Planetary Health Diet

The Planetary Health Diet (PHD) is a flexible, evidence-based dietary pattern designed to promote human health and protect the planet. It emphasizes the consumption of a variety of colourful fruits and vegetables, whole grains, legumes, nuts, and unsaturated oils while limiting red meat, processed meat, added sugars, refined grains, and starchy vegetables. The diet is adaptable to diverse cultures and food systems, aiming to reduce diet-related chronic disease risk and protect long-term planetary conservation. The PHD is a flexitarian diet that includes moderate amounts of fish and shellfish, poultry, dairy, and eggs, with red meat included in small quantities. It is estimated that universal adoption of the PHD could prevent 11 million deaths per year, largely by preventing coronary heart disease, stroke, type-2 diabetes, some cancers and other diseases. Traditional Vietnamese cuisine serves as a cultural model for healthy, sustainable eating and we sampled some delicious Vietnamese bread at our Lent Lunch, made by a local Vietnamese family.

An introduction to the Parish Giving Scheme

Why are regular gifts so important to your Church?

The Church of England offers a Christian presence in every community. Together we seek to make this Christian presence the heart of all our cities, towns and villages: by our wonderful buildings; by worshipping together; by serving our communities and by sharing our faith and values. This valuable contribution to our communities has a cost. For our Churches to survive and grow, they rely on regular gifts so that they can plan confidently for the future.

What is the Parish Giving Scheme?

The Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) has been set up to help your parish best manage regular gifts. It is a charity that is owned and funded by the Church of England.

How does it work?

Gifts can be made on a monthly, quarterly or annual basis, using the attached gift form and Direct Debit instruction. Even though gifts are made to the Parish Giving Scheme, they are restricted to your parish, giving you peace of mind that your gift cannot be used elsewhere. Unlike a utility bill you are always in charge of what you give. Your gift will be passed back to your parish by the 10th of the month. Gift Aid will be received separately once PGS has received it from HMRC. The unique feature of this scheme is the option for you to commit in principle to increase your gift annually in line with inflation. Whilst this is a voluntary decision, it is one that could potentially have a huge impact on the life and future of your church.

What are the main benefits?

Through your generous commitment, your church can be assured of a regular, tax-efficient source of income which has the capacity to increase with the cost of living, yet involves virtually no administration. You will benefit from a system that is secure, confidential and easy to use, while supporting your church today and for the future.

What next?

How do I go about signing up to the scheme?

Fill out the form opposite, with as much detail as possible using a black pen in BLOCK CAPITALS. Detach it from this leaflet following the cutting line and post it to the address given below.

Important: It is essential to complete all sections of the gift form in particular 'Church / Parish name; Diocese of; and PGS Parish code'. Please also ensure that you have ticked the box to say you have read and accepted the terms and conditions. Without this information in full, PGS cannot process your gift. **Note:** We welcome gifts from couples, so if you wish to make a joint gift please write your preferred title in the 'other' box. For the purpose of Gift Aid however they need the signature of just one individual who pays sufficient tax to cover the gift. Please add your initials in the Gift Aid signature box so they know which individual the declaration belongs to.

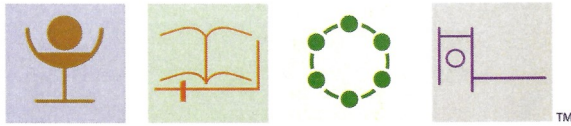
Then what can I expect?

Within 10 working days you will receive a letter confirming your personal details, the level, frequency and date of your first gift and the parish you wish to restrict it to. Please check this letter thoroughly to ensure that all the details are correct. In this letter you will receive a PGS reference number (located below the address) which needs to be retained by you, and quoted in any future communication you have with the Parish Giving Scheme. There will also be a bank reference code which begins with 'PGSGIFT', and ends with a unique number code. This is the description which will appear on your bank statement when each gift is given.

How will my parish be notified of my gift?

Your gift will be paid into your parish's bank account by the 10th of the month and Gift Aid will be received separately once PGS has received it from HMRC. Your parish's Planned Giving Representative receives a statement detailing the names of those who have given gifts through PGS. PGS will provide your parish's Planned Giving Representative with your postal address, however you can decide to remain anonymous by ticking the box on the right. If you decide to remain anonymous only the amount of the gift will be shared with your Representative. We encourage you to remain known to your parish, so that they can thank you and tell you more about how you can support them. This also helps them to avoid mistakenly approaching you in the future to consider a regular gift to your church.

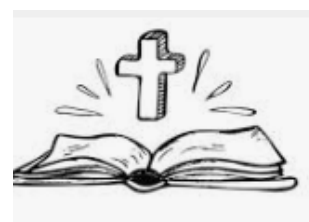
