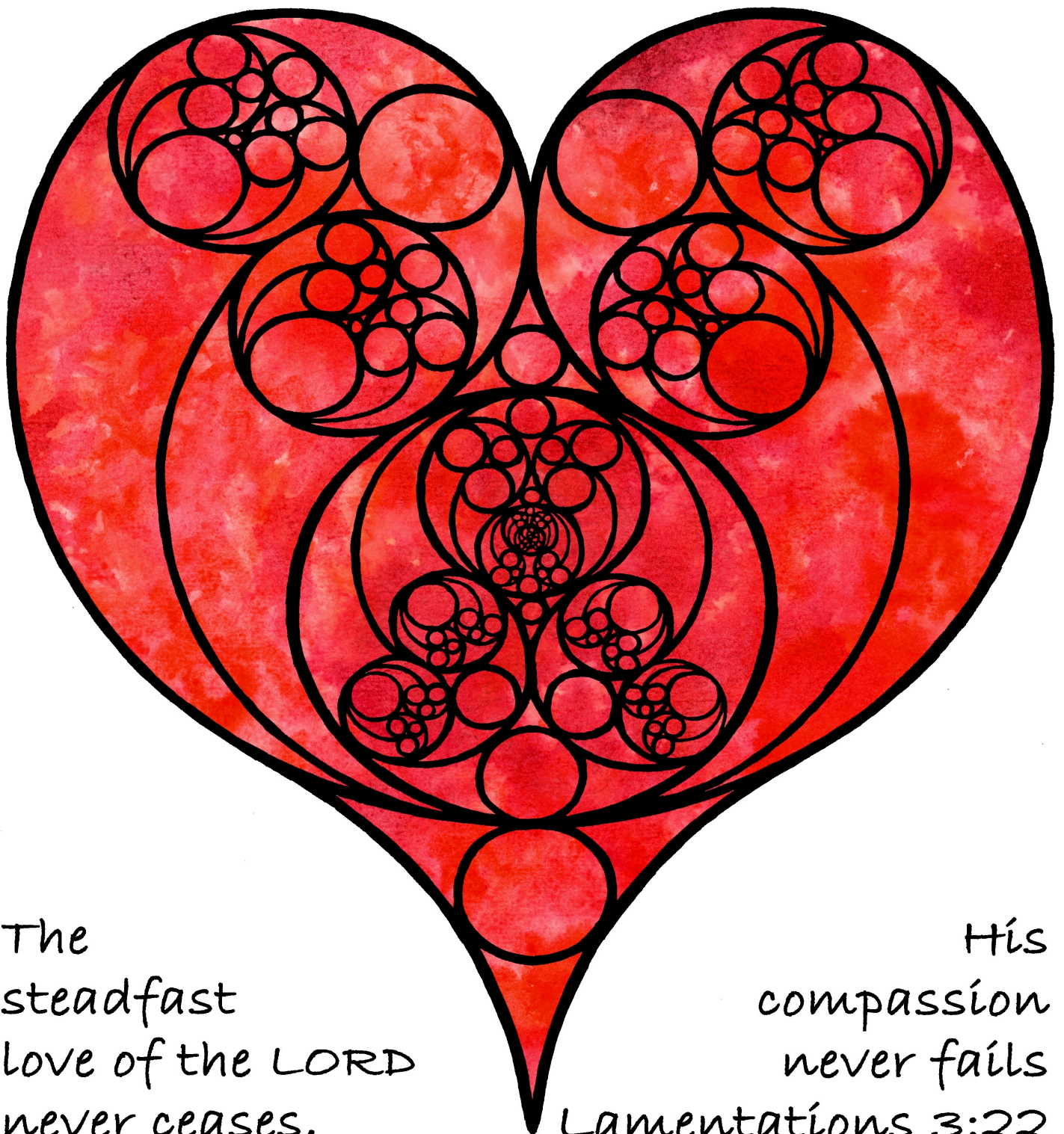

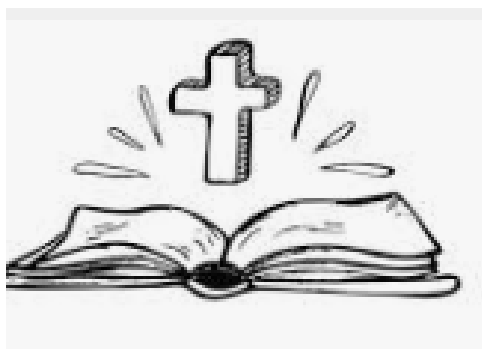

Forward From Michael Ranyard—A Christmas Carol

Over Christmas, a neighbour's son had to produce an essay on 'Scrooge', and that made me think again about the story. In 1843, Charles Dickens made a visit to some unpleasant factories in Manchester which used child labour and he was appalled by the conditions in which children worked and he was depressed by the wretchedness, the dirt and open immorality he saw among the inhabitants of these long rows of new, cramped brick houses.

It was to Dickens a new and shocking face of squalor, and it was this that gave him the impetus to write 'A Christmas Carol'. During his visit, he wrote to a friend, "God forgive us for the prosperity that is the fruit of our new machines and factories. I am going to throw myself on the feeling of the people with a short story. It will attempt to exploit the notion that Christmas is a merry time but entails duties and obligations, especially to the poor."

What many of the productions and versions of 'A Christmas Carol' overlook is that it is a Christian story about faith and the duties of faith, and it comes from 'Dickens' deep faith in Jesus. The story of Scrooge is structured as a Christmas carol, and all through, there are quotes from, or echos of the Gospels and Jesus' teaching.

The message is that faith implies action to meet the needs of others. Dickens has Marley's ghost tell Scrooge the lesson he has learnt. "Mankind was my business. The common welfare was my business; charity, mercy, forbearance, and benevolence, were, all, my business. The dealings of my trade were but a drop of water in the comprehensive ocean of my business!"

The epistle 1 John, contains a statement which has been one of the pillars of my faith, "whoever does not love the brother whom he can see cannot love God whom he has not seen."

It is perhaps a long way from Scrooge to how we are going to rebuild our small Christian community, but I think not. For whatever else we do, we must put our faith into action. Our first purpose is to offer worship to God that is attractive and inviting, but then folk need to see that we do offer practical serving love to our neighbours. For to misquote Marley, and Dickens, 'in God's name, humankind is our business. The common welfare is our business; charity, mercy, forbearance, and benevolence, are, all, our business.

Churchwarden Spotlight—St Peter's Bullinghope

Hello my name is Simon and I'm one of the church wardens at St Peter's Bullinghope.

I've been church warden at Bullinghope for many years and enjoy the challenges it brings.

Bullinghope Church is very important to me and my family. My parents got married there, I was baptized and my brother also got married there. My father (Jeff) who is also Churchwarden has been the church organist since 1968.

I work full time on the railway and in my spare time I'm also a supporter of Westfields FC as well as a rail enthusiast. I like travelling to different railway stations around the UK railway network.

I'm married to Natasha and have a stepson called Josh.

During the Interregnum we are only having 2 services a month. As we are a very small congregation.

I undertake most jobs associated with looking after the church from ringing clergy to confirming their attendance, making sure the right alter cloth is on. I also make sure order of services are ready. I'm at church early enough to put heating on so church is warm for start of services, making sure the boiler has enough oil to work and the water tanks are full. I also do a bit of cleaning in the church.

I lead Morning Prayer when no clergy are available and organise and head PCC Meetings.

There always seems to be something I need to email Sharon in the office for!

At the beginning of the Interregnum, I organised harvest festival, literally walking around Tesco the Friday before the service buying produce to decorate the church.

I led the Remembrance Sunday service, and I also decorated the church for Christmas and organised a coffee morning which we held at St Martins just before Christmas to raise funds for St Peters.

This also meant delivering leaflets around Bullinghope lane advertising harvest and Christmas services with the help of Jeff and my wife Natasha.

I also keep the churches Facebook page updated.

What would I like? Well, to get the congregation into double figures, we average about 5/6 now so it would be wonderful if more people from our wider parish would come and join us and help to keep our church an important part of the community.

Stewardship at St Martin's

In a church, stewardship is the faithful management of God's gifts (time, talents, treasures, and creation) as a disciple's grateful response to God's generosity, extending beyond money to include using one's whole life to serve God's mission, support the church, and bless others. It's a lifestyle of responsible stewardship, recognizing God as the owner of all resources and viewing oneself as a temporary manager.



Key aspects of church stewardship:

- **Biblical Foundation:** Rooted in the understanding that God owns everything, and humans are entrusted to manage it for His purposes, as seen in scriptures like Genesis.
- **Beyond Money:** While tithing (financial giving) is important, stewardship also encompasses using your time, talents, relationships, and even the environment responsibly.
- **A Way of Life:** It's a spiritual practice and a lifestyle choice, a daily decision to live as a follower of Christ, making God the priority.
- **Response to God's Love:** It's a joyful response to God's extravagant love, particularly the gift of Jesus, by giving your whole self back to Him.
- **Practical Application:** Involves practical actions like volunteering, leading worship, managing church property, and supporting ministries, ensuring resources build God's kingdom.
- **Stewardship vs. Fundraising:** Stewardship is a spiritual, relational approach to giving and managing resources, distinct from secular fundraising, focusing on cultivating generosity and accountability.

In essence, Christian stewardship is about being a faithful manager of all that God provides, using those gifts to honour Him, further His work, and bring blessings to the world.

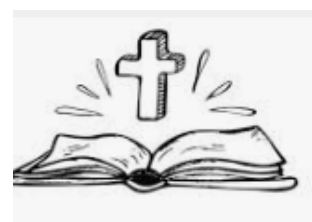
