#### Lamentations 1:1-6

# The Deserted City

1 How lonely sits the city
that once was full of people!
How like a widow she has become,
she that was great among the nations!
She that was a princess among the provinces
has become a vassal.

<sup>2</sup> She weeps bitterly in the night, with tears on her cheeks; among all her lovers she has no one to comfort her; all her friends have dealt treacherously with her, they have become her enemies.

#### 2 Timothy 1: 1-14

#### Salutation

1 Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus,

<sup>2</sup> To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

#### Thanksgiving and Encouragement

<sup>3</sup>I am grateful to God—whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did—when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. <sup>4</sup>Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. <sup>5</sup>I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. <sup>6</sup>For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; <sup>7</sup>for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

<sup>8</sup> Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, <sup>9</sup> who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, <sup>10</sup> but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Saviour Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. <sup>11</sup> For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, <sup>12</sup> and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. <sup>13</sup> Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. <sup>14</sup> Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

#### Luke 17: 5-10

<sup>5</sup> The apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!' <sup>6</sup> The Lord replied, 'If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea", and it would obey you.

<sup>7</sup> 'Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from ploughing or tending sheep in the field, "Come here at once and take your place at the table"? <sup>8</sup> Would you not rather say to him, "Prepare supper for me, put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink"? <sup>9</sup> Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? <sup>10</sup> So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, "We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!"

#### Bible Study based on 2 Timothy 1: 1-14

#### **Bible notes**

2 Timothy reads like a last will and testament. Paul (see p.x on the authorship of this letter) expects to die soon for his faith, and entrusts his legacy to his 'beloved child' Timothy. The language is affectionate and intimate, with its mention of tears of sadness alongside joy (v.4). Its unifying thread is the call to fight for the truth of the gospel against false teachers who deceive and disturb believers in Christ (see 2:14-19). Timothy is also unsettled by the prospect of Paul's death. Martyrdom brings shame rather than honour, both to martyrs and their sympathisers. So where will Timothy find the strength he needs to fulfil his calling?

Paul reminds Timothy of the human and divine strands of a treasured story of faith. Like Paul's, the faith of his mother and grandmother has strong Jewish roots, which provide stability under stress (v.5). Paul's suffering can also bring strength rather than shame, because it reveals the grace and calling of God (vv.9-12), which Paul has extended to Timothy by commissioning him to his ministry (v.6). Paul's brief reminder of Timothy's human resources leads him quite naturally to invoke the divine resources that sustain his faith and ministry, summed up by one of Paul's favourite words, 'grace' (vv.2, 9).

Notice how God's grace is revealed in Timothy's story: as a reason for gratitude (v.3); as the call to share in Paul's ministry (vv.6, 9); as a source of divine strength that turns shame into honour (vv.7, 8); as the expression of God's eternal purpose rather than a reward for Timothy's abilities or ambitions (v.9); as the divine trust that will guard him in the face of opposition (v.12); as the Holy Spirit, which like faith is 'living in us' (vv.5, 14).

God's grace is embodied in 'the appearing of our Saviour Christ Jesus' (v.10). The italicised words, borrowed from the worship of pagan gods and the Roman emperor, highlight the unique power of Christ Jesus over death by refusing to give it the last word, not least in the face of martyrdom (vv.10,12). This is good news worth proclaiming and teaching, as the treasured story of 'the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus' (v.13).


#### Reflection

Spend a few moments thinking about what stands out for you from the Bible reading. This idea may help.

There are many ways to protect something – you could put it in a strong box or a safe, wrap it in bubble wrap or cotton wool, or add a password to keep it secure. But God's Word shouldn't be password protected – we treasure it by passing it on. The good news, our treasured story that is encompassed within the pages of the Bible and has been handed down to us, needs to be shared with others, directly through sharing the Word of God, but also in the witness of how we live our lives, as Timothy is encouraged to do.

You may wish to use these questions and the picture to help you think about or discuss issues arising from this week's Bible passage.

- How could you share your faith with friends and family so that it is something they treasure too?
