South Wye Team Ministry Newsletter 10th March 2024 - Mothering Sunday

Hello Everyone, I hope that you are all keeping safe and well. Between last weekends snow, a couple of proper downpours and then a couple of really warm Spring days this week, it's hard to tell if March is coming in like a lamb or a lion, making it more difficult for the amateur meteorologist to predict what will be going on by the end of the month. Weather forecasting may not seem like a necessary skill for clergy and ministers, but it would be really handy. Every other Friday there is a little conversation about whether we should hold our communion service outside or retreat into the Community centre. We try to stay outside if we possibly can, if it is just cold – after all everyone is in their coats anyway – or a bit windy – which sometimes means a special liturgical role for someone to crouch beside the GoPak altar holding the order of service and linen and silver in place. A clerical weatherperson would be handy.

It would also be really handy to know ahead of time whether the weather will interrupt our Palm Sunday procession or the dawn service on Easter day. Ideally there would be very specific weather for the dawn vigil – warm and dry until 6:10am for the bonfire, lighting the candle and entry into church, followed by a heavy shower whilst the service goes on, extinguishing the bonfire so we don't have to worry about it and then fine again by 7:30am for everyone going home from the post-service bacon sandwiches. Although that precise combination doesn't happen often, it would be really useful to know what weather to plan for.

The weather is equally a source of worry for those planning weddings at our churches. The relationship between wedding photographers and clergy has been in the news lately, but we try hard to be welcoming which usually includes offering that if the weather is dreadful, the group and family photos could be taken in Church. Of course, a bit of rain need not spoil the day, but it can be difficult to convince a bride of that when she has been planning for two years.

Our reading from Colossians on Sunday is one that is often used at weddings, allowing the preacher to talk about it as advice for how the newly-weds should live together – with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, patience, forbearance and forgiveness – 'clothed with love.' Which is all very lovely – and a bit of a gift for preaching really – but that advice is actually given not to couples, but to a community. This being Paul, it's not really advice either, it's more of an instruction. "This is how you should live together as a worshipping community of Christians."

So not just an instruction, but a challenge! Whatever the weather, whether we are going through a sunny period as a church – or a family or other community - or if things are a bit more stormy, we should bear with one another. As the saying goes, there is no such thing as bad weather, just the wrong clothing. If we are really clothed with love, if the peace of Christ really rules our hearts, then we will be prepared to weather the weather – whatever the weather.

Readings for Mothering Sunday

Numbers 21: 4-9

⁴ From Mount Hor they set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. ⁵ The people spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food.' ⁶ Then the LORD sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. ⁷ The people came to Moses and said, 'We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us.' So Moses prayed for the people. ⁸ And the LORD said to Moses, 'Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live.' ⁹ So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

Psalm 107: 1-3, 17-22

- ¹O give thanks to the LORD, for he is good; for his steadfast love endures for ever.
- ² Let the redeemed of the LORD say so, those he redeemed from trouble
- ³ and gathered in from the lands, from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south.
- ¹⁷ Some were sick through their sinful ways, and because of their iniquities endured affliction;
- ¹⁸ they loathed any kind of food, and they drew near to the gates of death.
- ¹⁹ Then they cried to the LORD in their trouble, and he saved them from their distress;

- ²¹ Let them thank the LORD for his steadfast love, for his wonderful works to humankind.
- ²² And let them offer thanksgiving sacrifices, and tell of his deeds with songs of joy.

Ephesians 2: 1-10

2 You were dead through the trespasses and sins ² in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. ³ All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. ⁴ But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us ⁵ even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved— ⁶ and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, ⁷ so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness towards us in Christ Jesus. ⁸ For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God— ⁹ not the result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹⁰ For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

Colossians 3:12-17

As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

John 3: 14-21

- ¹⁴ And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵ that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.
- ¹⁶ For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.
- ¹⁷ 'Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. ¹⁸ Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. ¹⁹ And this is the judgement, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. ²⁰ For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. ²¹ But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God.'



Bible Study

The perspective of the world portrayed in John's Gospel is one of contrasts: life and death, light and darkness. There is no 'in between', no shadows, no half-light. People choose: life or death, light or darkness. John picks up the imagery of the bronze serpent in this week's Old Testament reading. Just as anyone who chose to look up at the bronze serpent would live, so anyone who believes in Jesus will live. The act of looking at the serpent was an act of faith, of looking for healing; so too is looking to Jesus for healing which brings life. John's explanation of this is God's unconditional love. The newly formed people of God in the Old Testament reading needed tangible ways to understand God and to express themselves to God. So, they were given ways of doing this – the sacrificial system, offerings, the bronze serpent. The need persists; but now, says John, God loves the world so much that God comes to the world in person – a truly tangible way of demonstrating how to live in the light.

Reflection

'What is that noise?' Ben thought to himself as he heard the third crash coming from Sophie's bedroom followed by, once again, the sound of little feet running around. As he opened the bedroom door he saw Sophie, running full pelt up and down the length of the room, arms waving. The room was in darkness, the thick curtains closed, shutting out the sunlight. As he watched, Sophie cannoned into the bag of toys, sending one flying into the side of the wardrobe, which, as it wobbled, dropped the game balanced on its top, causing yet another crash. Ben caught Sophie as she flew past once again, and asked what was going on. 'I'm trying to get rid of the dark!' she explained. 'There's no need to chase the dark,' said Ben, as he drew the curtains. 'Look, we can let in the light!'
