

South Wye Team Ministry Newsletter 17th March 2024 5th Sunday of Lent

Hello Everyone, I hope that you are all keeping safe and well.

As I write this we are looking forward to welcoming the first groups of children to church for Easter visits. 90 children from year one will gather at St Martin's to think about the joy of Palm Sunday and the shock of the arrest and trial. Amongst other activities, they will be given a single seed (sunflower rather than wheat) and encouraged to think about how small and dead it looks, but it carries within it the promise of a new and glorious life – a tall, beautiful sunflower, which will carry maybe hundreds of new seeds. They will be given the seed to take home and maybe plant – it may stand more chance of getting home than the little chocolate eggs that they will also take with them.

This analogy, of a seed that does not look alive, but needs to be buried so that it can grow and live echoes Jesus' words in Sunday's Gospel reading. It's the first in a set of contradictions in the passage where our expectations are overturned. The hour of Jesus' glory has come – but glory is not going to look as we or the world would expect it to. Then our understanding of life itself is overturned "those who love their life must lose it, those who hate (*perhaps 'reject' is a closer word*) their life will keep it for eternity." Even the reasonable reaction of those who do not want to see Jesus' death is overturned – this is exactly why he's here. God has sent him to reveal God's glorious life, which is far greater than anything that the world can offer.

As he overturns our expectations Jesus makes us think carefully about those things that we have valued, that we and the wider world see as good, desirable and important. He casts a new light too on those things that we and the wider world see as bad and undesirable. He promises that God is at work through all these things, overturning pain and grief and desolation.

The knowledge that God is at work, even in the most difficult and isolated times of our lives, that we are not abandoned, that God can bring goodness and beauty, even from the hardest experiences is a huge overturning of our expectations. It is important though to remember that saying that God works through the tragedies and hardships of our lives is not the same as saying that God wants us to suffer, or has caused our sufferings for this reason.

These are huge and complex theological thoughts and may be beyond the scope of our conversation with year one this afternoon – we'll probably stick to the sunflower seeds – but the promise that Jesus came to overturn our expectations and the world's priorities is at the core of the story of Holy Week. As we prepare for Palm Sunday next week, what are the priorities and aspirations that we need to overturn?

The Wider View:

Jeremiah 31: 31-34

³¹ The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ³² It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. ³³ But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴ No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the LORD', for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Psalm 51: 1-13

- ¹ Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions.
- ² Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin.
- ³ For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me.
- ⁴ Against you, you alone, have I sinned, and done what is evil in your sight, so that you are justified in your sentence and blameless when you pass judgement.

⁵ So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

'You are my Son,

⁶ as he says also in another place,


'You are a priest for ever,


according to the order of Melchizedek.'

⁷ In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. ⁸ Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; ⁹ and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, ¹⁰ having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

John 12: 20-33

²⁰ Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. ²¹ They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.' ²² Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. ²³ Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. ²⁴ Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. ²⁵ Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. ²⁶ Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour. ²⁷ 'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—"Father, save me from this hour"? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. ²⁸ Father, glorify your name.' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' ²⁹ The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, 'An angel has spoken to him.' ³⁰ Jesus answered, 'This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. ³¹ Now is the judgement of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. ³² And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself.' ³³ He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.





Bible Study

Bible notes


Following their time in the wilderness, the people of God settle into the 'promised land'. Their success at living as God's people is mixed, with periods of faithfulness to God and periods when they go astray. Through the prophets God calls them to return to living their covenant relationship with God. Close to 500 years after being set free from slavery, the land splits into two kingdoms, a divided people. A couple of hundred years later, having persistently ignored the warnings to turn back to God, the northern kingdom is captured by Assyria, the ruling superpower of the time, and is no more. Little over 100 years on, the much smaller southern kingdom is also ignoring warnings to turn back to God from, among others, Jeremiah. Jeremiah pronounces God's judgement on the remaining people of God, which will lead to their capture and exile at the hands of Babylon, the current ruling superpower. However, Jeremiah's message is tinged with hope and promise. After the judgement and exile will come restoration. When God's people, in exile, turn back to God, God will make a new covenant with them.

This covenant, described in today's reading, will be characterised by a close relationship with God. It will not rely on a knowledge of God mediated to the people by a few, or passed on through the stories of God's past interactions with them. It will be a new covenant, a covenant for this people, the current and future people of God. At its heart is the promise that 'I will be their God, and they shall be my people' (v.33). Some 500 years later, despite a return to God and from exile, the promise has not been fully realised and some of the people of God look for this being fulfilled in Jesus.

Reflection

When you buy a stick of rock at the seaside it's easily identifiable. Running through it is the name of the place to which it belongs: 'Blackpool', 'Hunstanton', 'Brighton'. Wherever you break the rock, however much or little you eat, at every point it has its identifying feature. In the new covenant, God says that God's law will be within people, written on their hearts – running through us like the name in a stick of rock. What do people see in us that identifies us as who – and whose – we are.

Questions for reflection



- What ideas and beliefs are at the core of your being?
- What does God's promise 'I will be their God and they shall be my people', mean to you?
- How might having God's law written on your heart be freeing?
